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

District health care center

The Board of Education approved an agreement to establish a school-based primary care health center to create greater access to health care for our students. The district spent the last school year investigating options and developing a plan. Earlier this year, district administrators and several members of the community visited a similar school-based health center operating in Hannibal to learn more about operations and best practices.

The center will be operated in partnership with Clarity, which is affiliated with Burrell Behavioral Health. The collaboration is the result of a partnership created to develop a comprehensive system of school-based primary health care services to promote and ensure physical health care of students.



This partnership includes the establishment of a health care center, while also addressing academic, social, and physical health in an integrated approach designed to maximize student success. The center will be located in a portion of the district's Field Building and will be available to all CPS students.

Services provided through the health center are being offered in addition to the health services already offered by CPS, including school nurses and individualized nursing services provided to students with special needs.

Primary care services provided to all students will include:

- Acute visits (sore throat, fever, sprained ankle, etc.)
- Preventative visits
- Sports physicals
- Vision services
- Free vaccines through the Vaccines for Children (VFC) program
- In-house lab services (strep tests, influenza, etc.)
- Reference lab services
- Documentation of the visit provided to the child's primary care physician (PCP), if not a Clarity patient

Additionally, counseling services will also be available, including:

- Behavioral assessments and evaluations
- Referrals to counseling sessions for individuals and/or family
- Referrals to trauma-focused counseling with licensed or licensed-eligible counselors specializing in trauma
- Referrals to substance use disorder counseling services and treatment

There is no budgetary impact to the district for the operation of this partnership. Clarity is exclusively responsible for the expenses of supplies for health services, as well as the training and travel of their personnel.



Clarity will establish a sliding fee schedule as determined by the

Federal Poverty Guidelines in accordance

with Health Resources and Service Administration. A sliding fee discount program allows individuals and families who are uninsured or underinsured to receive services for a fee that is adjusted based on their ability to pay, assuring that no one will be denied access to services. Children that are on the district's free or reduced-price school lunch program are deemed to be on a sliding fee.

For those that do not qualify for service fee waivers, Clarity will be solely responsible for billing patients and/or third-party payers for all services rendered.

Tips for school success

Helpful tips for you to encourage your student academically at home.



Columbia Public Schools is committed to helping scholars succeed in all aspects of their educational life. Parents and guardians are also extremely instrumental in supporting our students. Here are some helpful tips for you to encourage your student academically at home:



Attendance is a critical factor for student success. If our scholars are not in school, they are less likely to achieve at the same level as their attending peers. Barring an illness, please support your child in getting to school every day.



Encourage your child to submit their work on time. You as a parent/guardian can check lessons, assignments, and grades using Schoology and Campus Parent.



Ask specific and targeted questions. Instead of asking your child "How was school today?" and them replying "fine," try:

- "Tell me one thing you learned today that surprised you."
- "What is a connection you made today to something that has happened in your life?"
- "Tell me about a mistake you made today and what you learned from that mistake and how you reacted to it."



Provide a separate space for your scholar to study. It doesn't have to be a special room, but a spot in your home that is specifically for homework and is quiet with minimal distractions.



Practice goal setting with your children. Set family goals, share goals you have for yourself, and ask your kids to share academic and personal goals with you. Discuss the purpose of goal achievement and a timeline for achieving those goals.



Get back into a school schedule as summer ends. Please encourage your student to:

- Get a good night's sleep
- Eat an appropriate breakfast before leaving for school
- Learn a technique of their choice to help them relax in case they experience anxiety
- Use a planner or calendar to keep track of due dates, and include time to study on that calendar
- Complete the tasks or homework they dislike most first. When they
 accomplish the task they didn't want to do, they won't feel that drag of
 procrastination and resentment towards the other work they are expected
 to complete.

Construction updates

DISTRICT-WIDE IMPROVEMENTS

CPS construction crews stayed busy this summer with projects at virtually every school building in the district. Work included security upgrades, ADA improvements, athletic field improvements, HVAC replacement and repairs and general overall maintenance. Some highlights include security and accessibility upgrades to the main entrances at West Boulevard, New Haven, Two Mile Prairie, Shepard Boulevard, Parkade and Derby Ridge elementary schools as well as Gentry, Smithton and Lange middle schools and Battle High School. Also completed were HVAC replacement and repairs at Shepard Boulevard Elementary School, Oakland Middle School and Hickman High School.

RUSSELL BOULEVARD ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

The **Russell Boulevard Elementary School** renovations to the current building are complete. The additional construction including new classrooms, a multi-purpose room, special education rooms and an elevator, a storm shelter for improved safety during severe weather and other adjustments will be complete before winter break. The school's increased capacity will accommodate 650 students.

BOONE COUNTY NATURE SCHOOL


Construction continues at the **Boone County Nature School** and is expected to be completed for the start of the 2024-25 school year.

COLUMBIA AREA CAREER CENTER

Construction planning and design for the **Columbia Area Career Center** renovation and addition is underway, and signs of progress such as demolition, staging and electrical work are set to begin this fall. This project is being tightly coordinated to ensure that safe and expected use of the space can continue while construction is underway.

NEW ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Progress continues on the design of the **new elementary school** located next to John Warner Middle School. A primary consideration is anticipating further growth of traffic in the area. CPS designers and engineers are especially focused on finding ways to mitigate traffic issues that could occur on CPS property, including special consideration for how to place the building in order to facilitate effective drop off and pick up, as well as ways to address other traffic concerns on Sinclair Road.





District earns national awards


